Lynette believes every child–free or incarcerated–deserves a high-quality education. As an education consultant, Lynette visits juvenile justice facilities and supports juvenile justice educators within the United States and internationally. She uses her research and work to serve as a resource to support country and state juvenile justice leaders. Her areas of expertise include practice, research, policy, and advocacy within carceral spaces.
